NO CATCHMENT POWERS PROPOSED

There is no intention by the Department of Natural Resources and Water to extend the declared catchment powers under the Water Act to the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam.

In a report to the Community Futures Task Force DNR&W reaffirmed its previous announcements that there was no intention to take up the powers.

The Department has advised that broader matters of land use in catchments of major dams may be considered in Local Government Planning Schemes or under the environmental protection legislation.

LAND USE AND INFRASTRUCTURE PLANNING STUDY FOR THE PROPOSED TRAVESTON CROSSING DAM

The Office of Urban Management (OUM) and the Department of Local Government, Planning, Sport and Recreation (DLGPSR) are jointly undertaking the Land Use and Infrastructure Planning Study for the proposed Traveston Crossing area.

The purpose of the planning study is to investigate the impacts of the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam on existing land uses and infrastructure and the opportunities which may be able to be incorporated into a long term land use plan and infrastructure program for the area.

Current investigations are focusing on the townships of Kandanga and Imbil/Brooloo and the rural residential area of Carters Ridge to look specifically at the options for future development of these areas.

These studies are looking specifically at the potential impact of the proposed dam on the existing settlements and the land use planning required for the future sustainability of these communities.

The OUM hosted the first round of community workshops in these townships in November and December 2006.

The purpose of these workshops was to enable local residents, businesses, industry bodies and community groups to identify key issues of concern regarding the future of their towns.

Officers from the various State agencies also attended to provide information in relation to the other activities which are being coordinated by the Community Futures Task Force. Notes from the Kandanga, Imbil-Brooloo and Carters Ridge meetings are now available on the OUM website (www.oum.qld.gov.au).

These notes will be forwarded to those community members that registered at each of the meetings. The OUM also received 12 written submissions during the consultation period.

Meetings have also been held with Cooloola Shire Council to discuss land use issues and with state agencies to coordinate the outcomes from initiatives such as the Economic Futures Project being undertaken by Department of State Development.

The information and feedback from the community, local government and state agencies is being used to assist in identifying the direct and indirect impacts on existing land uses and infrastructure around the proposed dam site.

The OUM and DLGPSR will meet with community members from Kandanga and Imbil townships over the next few months to discuss ideas on how to best plan for their townships and to further engage with their communities.

A second meeting with the Carter's Ridge community will be arranged in early 2007 to further discuss planning issues for their area.

Meetings are also being arranged in early 2007 for the townships of Federal and Amamoor to talk to these communities about the impact of the proposed dam.

The OUM will provide information to the community on the timing and location of the meetings.

The second phase of the planning study will also look at the impacts and the planning opportunities for the broader Traveston Crossing area.

Further opportunities for community input into this part of the planning study will be provided later in 2007.

PROGRESS REPORTS ON SOCIAL, ECONOMIC AND INFRASTRUCTURE STUDIES

The member agencies of the Community Futures Task Force (CFTF) have started a number of social, economic and land use projects and studies in the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam region.

These projects and studies involve long term and short term activities for the Mary Valley communities as part of the CFTF terms of reference commitments.

The CFTF will continue to report to the communities on the progress and outcomes of these diverse social, economic and land use and infrastructure studies.

SOCIAL PROJECTS AND STUDIES

ST1. KANDANGA ONE STOP SHOP

Project Description

The Department of Communities operates the Kandanga One Stop Shop at 80 Main Street, Kandanga. A number of Queensland Government agencies have staff visit the shop to provide assistance to people of the Mary Valley. Lifeline has a service operating from the One Stop Shop.

Project Purpose

The One Stop Shop provides:

- advice on government services;
- referral service to other government agencies; and
- counselling support to individuals.

Progress Report – Government Services

- As at 25 January 2007, the One Stop Shop has had 1205 enquiries from people seeking information, advice, financial support or individual counselling.
- The One Stop Shop has two (2) government staff and is open Monday to Friday, from 8:00am to 5:00pm.
- Ongoing referral assistance is provided to individuals to access other government services including assistance to workers who have lost or will lose employment as a result of the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam, small business advice and details of other relevant government programs and services.
- A Community Development and Engagement Officer commenced at the One Stop Shop on 22 January 2007. This officer will implement projects and support programs that will assist the communities to maintain social cohesion.
- The Department of Communities coordinates and leads the State Government Regional Services Forum. The Forum brings together regional directors of State Government agencies providing services in the Traveston Crossing area. Meetings have been arranged to follow the CFTF meetings, to ensure any regional and service delivery issues raised through the Task Force are followed up at the Regional

Services Forum.

- Two officers from the Department of State Development provide a visiting service to the One Stop Shop, meeting with business clients by appointment.

Progress Report – Outreach and Counselling Services

- Lifeline have three (3) counselling staff located at the One Stop Shop.
- Lifeline has established an outreach service that offers people in the Mary Valley counselling support in their homes.
- There have been 336 enquiries involving counselling support.
- Lifeline provides a 24 hour crisis line offering counselling services.
- Lifeline has established a network of service providers to improve coordination of the services in the Mary Valley.
- Lifeline has attended community meetings and provided on site counselling support to individuals as required.

Timelines/Milestones

The services of the Kandanga One Stop Shop are ongoing.

Lifeline service at the One Stop Shop and outreach service (home visits) is ongoing.

Community engagement activities that involve the Community Development and Engagement Officer are being developed.

ST2. COMMUNITY FUTURES TASK FORCE SUPPORT PROGRAM

Project Description

The CFTF is an independent body established to address the immediate effects of the decision to build the Traveston Crossing Dam and identify opportunities that enable the communities to position themselves for the future.

The Task Force is chaired by Major General Peter Arnison and its members include the Mayors of the Cooloola, Maroochy, Noosa, Beaudesert and Boonah Shires as well as the Directors-General of the key Queensland Government Departments. (The Mayors of Boonah and Beaudesert are involved as the Task Force is also dealing with the immediate effects of the proposed Wyaralong Dam).

The Task Force meets on a regular basis to address the immediate concerns of the community and to coordinate longer term Task Force projects that are being led by the Departments.

Purpose of the Project

The purpose of the Task Force is to:

- Address the immediate affects on individuals and communities, arising from the decision to build the dams.
- Develop strategies to maximise the longer term opportunities presented by the proposed dams
- Community engagement in the Task Force work program and provide regular community information
- Provide Community/Government linkages to address issues and impacts

Progress Report

- Major General Peter Arnison made nine (9) visits to the Mary Valley, met with individuals and attended community meetings.
- Staff of the Task Force have made an additional seven (7) visits to the Mary Valley, to follow up on issues raised by individuals and community groups.
- A sensitive matter is the future of the Kandanga Cemetery. Staff of the Task Force are meeting with individuals, to listen to their wishes about the future of the Cemetery.
- The Task Force has provided support to community groups, sporting clubs and schools in the Mary Valley to assist with events and ongoing services.
- The Task Force has provided assistance and support to over 100 residents in the Mary Valley.
- The Task Force has published six (6) newsletters to the communities in the Mary Valley, informing them about services that are available and where appropriate developments in relation to the proposed dam.
- The Task Force coordinated the publication of the "DNRW Forum Questions and Answers".
- The Task Force is publishing regular progress reports for its projects.
- The Task Force has established a website to inform communities about information resources and services that are available as well as forthcoming events.
- The Task Force is coordinating the work of Government departments that are undertaking social, economic and infrastructure projects that will be ensuring continued sustainability and prosperity for the communities in the area of the proposed dam.

ST3. QUEENSLAND STATE ARCHIVES COMMUNITY HISTORY PROJECT

Project description

The project has two components; firstly, a quality booklet incorporating text and photographs which would provide a lasting acknowledgement of selected aspects of the history of the areas affected by the proposed dam. Secondly, the staging of community archive workshops by



ECONOMIC AND LAND USE PROJECTS

Queensland State Archives (QSA) will assist local historical groups and individuals in recording and managing local historically significant materials, including photographic collections.

This project encourages members of the community to share and celebrate aspects of their history in a meaningful and enduring way. Recognition of historical and cultural value in these regions assists in strengthening social cohesion and highlighting community distinctiveness.

Project purpose

To acknowledge and document selected aspects of the historical significance of the regions and communities close to the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam.

Progress to date

In August 2006, QSA staff consulted with representatives from the Cooloolo Shire Council to scope an historical project suitable to the community's requirements. The Mayor of Cooloolo agreed that an historical booklet would have a lasting positive affect for the community.

After a tender process in late 2006, professional historians were appointed in January 2007 by QSA to research and write the booklet. Professor Kay Saunders AM and Dr Murray Johnson will finalise a research brief after consultation with Council representatives.

It is anticipated that two Community Archive Workshops will be presented during 2007. Development of the first workshop has been finalised and is ready for delivery in early 2007.

ET1. ECONOMIC FUTURES PROJECT: "SCOPING ECONOMIC FUTURES - TRAVESTON REGION" (SECONDARY AND TERTIARY INDUSTRIES)

Project Description

Tasman to complete a study that overviewed the economies of the region around the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam. ET4. BUSINESS TRAINING AND SUPPORT

Project Description

Officers of State Development are providing training workshops and targeted business case management services to business operators in the region.

CFTF SUPPORTS NEW MARY VALLEY WORKING GROUP

The CFTF has agreed to provide financial support for the proposed Mary Valley Tourism Map, a project being undertaken by the Mary Valley Working Group through the Cooloola Regional Development Board (CRDB).

The provision of \$3000 will support other committed funding for the development of the map and its production.

The Assessment Committee of the Task Force has placed a condition on the funding to ensure that all local businesses in the Mary Valley be made aware of the map and be given the opportunity to place a business advertisement in the map.

To support this activity, the CFTF has indicated it will provide additional funding towards the advertising costs in the local media in the region, including the Gympie Times and the Mary Valley Voice.

Following a public meeting on February 9, the newly formed Mary Valley Working group has as an interim measure appointed local businessman Vince Carige ('Brooloo Park' Equine Resort) as its facilitator, CRDB general manager Brian Arnold as secretary and James Arkle (Lagoon Pocket B & B) as promotions officer.

The MVWG is committed to marketing the Mary Valley and developing a long term strategy for the development of a comprehensive program.

The group is keen to foster and form the development of business clusters to achieve these goals.

The MVWG will identify the points of difference that the Mary Valley offers visitors and tourists.

The first project is the development and consolidation of the map.

The group is to encourage the Friends of Imbil to expand and work with the CRDB to connect power and upgrade the Imbil Tourist Information Centre.

Community members study the draft Terms of Reference display material for the Environmental Impact Study presented at the Maryborough Information Day conducted earlier this month by QWI.

DRAFT TERMS OF REFERENCE CLOSE

The period for public submissions on the draft Terms of Reference (ToR) for the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) will close on Monday 19 February.

Following this date, the Coordinator-General will finalise the ToR, and will consider all comments received about the draft ToR. The final ToR will then be provided to Queensland Water Infrastructure (QWI).

QWI will prepare an EIS in accordance with the requirements of the final ToR. Once the EIS has been prepared to the satisfaction of the Coordinator-General, a public notice will be advertised in relevant newspapers circulating in the district, the state and nationally.

The notice will advise:

- where copies of the EIS are available for inspection and how it can be purchased;
- that submissions may be made to the Coordinator-General about the EIS; and
- the submission period.

Based on the submissions received regarding the content of the EIS, QWI may then be required to prepare a Supplementary EIS to address specific matters raised.

At the completion of the EIS, the Coordinator-General will prepare a report evaluating the EIS and other related material, pursuant to s35 of State Development Public Works Organisation Act 1971. The Coordinator-General's report will be publicly notified and a copy provided to the Federal Minister for Environment and Water Resources to enable his assessment under Part 9 of the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 to commence.

EXPERIENCED COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT OFFICER JOINS THE ONE STOP SHOP

A new Community Development and Engagement Officer has been appointed to the Mary River Valley region by the Department of Communities.

Marie Hensley, who holds a Masters degree in Regional Development, will be working from the One Stop Shop at 80 Main Street, Kandanga.

Marie, who is also a resident in the area, has more than 10 years' experience in regional centres in New South Wales and Queensland including the Tiaro Shire.

She has extensive experience in community development and engagement with landholders and small towns in New South Wales areas experiencing drought conditions. .

Marie was the development officer for the Coolah Shire Council in New South Wales and also worked for the Orana Regional Development and the Rural Lands Protection Boards.

Marie will be meeting with local organisations, groups and individuals to identify opportunities and initiatives to enhance community well being.

MARYBOROUGH INFORMATION DAY REPORT

More than 140 people attended a second Community Information Day on the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) process.

The Information Day was hosted by Queensland Water Infrastructure (QWI) on Saturday 20 January in Maryborough and followed the release of the draft Terms of Reference (ToR) by the Coordinator-General on 9 December 2006.

Members of the community, including several local, state and federal elected representatives, took advantage of the opportunity to speak to QWI project team members and ask questions about the community engagement process. They were also provided with information on

how to participate in the review along with copies of the draft ToR and information on how to participate in the review.

QWI Chief Executive Officer Graeme Newton said the day, which followed the community information day on 16 December 2006 at Amamoor, offered the chance for the Wide Bay community to learn more about the EIS consultation process and how they could get involved.

“Our aim was to provide an open environment for people to digest the available information at their own pace and speak to some of the project experts to seek clarification or ask further questions,” he said.

“Although feedback on the ToR needs to be directed to the Coordinator-General, we believe it is important and appropriate to make copies

available and encourage the community to have input in shaping the final studies that will be undertaken as part of the EIS,” Mr Newton said.

“Those who attended the day demonstrated a keen interest to learn more about the EIS process and took advantage of the opportunity to speak to project team members.”

Feedback collected at the information day will be collated and where relevant, responses will be made. It will then be reported in the final consultation report which will form part of the EIS.

A number of other information days will be held throughout the EIS process during 2007.

NATIVE TITLE INFORMATION MEETING HELD

Queensland Water Infrastructure (QWI) hosted a Native Title Information Meeting for the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam on Saturday 10th February. The company met with those indigenous persons who assert a native title interest for the project area.

QWI CEO Graeme Newton said the meeting was the first stage of a comprehensive native title and cultural heritage process.

“The focus of the meeting was to give those indigenous persons who have a native title interest in the project area an opportunity to gain information about the process,” Mr Newton said.

“QWI wishes to reach a native title agreement for the project area, and the meeting began the process of identifying those people who claim to have an interest in the project area to ensure that their rights are accommodated within the agreement,” he said.

The agreement will take the form of an Indigenous Land Use Agreement (ILUA), and will deal with the voluntary acquisition of native title and management of indigenous cultural heritage for the project area.

QWI is working to ensure that all indigenous persons with an interest in the area are consulted throughout the process, in the absence of any registered native title claim over the project area.

WATER METER PROGRAM COMMENCES

The Department of Natural Resources and Water has commenced the first stage of a roll out of rural meters in the Wide Bay and Widgee Creek catchments.

This is part of a State wide process of rural water management in all surface water and groundwater resources

Notices advising water entitlement holders about the metering project were posted out at the end of January.

A Community Information session to explain the metering program to the affected landowners was held on the 14th February at Kilkivan.

Individual site assessments will be carried out in the near future to determine the most suitable meters to install.

FLOOD INSURANCE

When the Deputy Premier met with the community at Gympie (3 November 2006), one of the questions raised was whether residents in stage two of the proposed Traveston Crossing Dam would have access to flood insurance.

To get an answer to this question, the Community Futures Task Force contacted the Insurance Council of Australia (ICA). Many of Australia's major insurance providers are members of the Insurance Council.

Residential flood insurance may be available from some insurance companies now, however it is not at presently widely available in Australia as a standard residential product.

It is however generally available for commercial properties.

To find out if you can access cover you should shop around to different insurers as it is a highly competitive market and some insurers may cover residents now.

The Insurance Council is coordinating an industry project designed to increase the availability of residential flood insurance and as part of this project is liaising with all levels of Government.

The Insurance Council has been provided with the Draft Terms of Reference for the EIS and has been asked to comment on the adequacy of the EIS flood modelling and hydrological studies for insurance purposes.
